



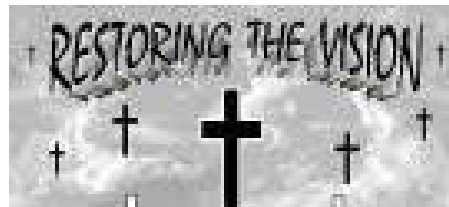

Vision Of The School: An Evangelising Church Pat Kelly



We know that God loves every person in the whole world; every person is special, unique and cherished in his heart. This is the message of the scriptures— God loved us so much he sent his only son to die on the cross to save us from sin and offer us the free gift of salvation. We know this is true because we have experienced it in our own life.

God's love for us is at the heart of evangelisation, we have experienced God's love and mercy and forgiveness and we want to share it with others. And what is more important is that GOD wants us to share this Good News with others. In responding to the call to evangelise we are responding to what is dearest to the heart of God. God, our kind and loving Father, does not want anyone to be lost but he wants all to come to the knowledge of the truth of salvation found in his Son, Jesus.

The last act of Jesus was to commission his disciples to go out to the whole world to tell them the Good News and make new disciples. The first act of God the Holy Spirit, was to send the disciples out to obey Jesus' command on the wonderful day of Pentecost. Evangelisation was the first priority of the Church then and it is the first priority of the Church now. The teaching of Vatican 11, emphasized over and over

again by Pope Paul VI and Pope John Paul II, is that the Church exists to evangelise. For most people their experience of Church is the people of their own parish. If the Church is to be an evangelising Church then our parishes have to be evangelising parishes and this can only happen if our "ordinary parishioners" are evangelising disciples.

In response to this, the recent National Coordinators Meeting, re-focused on the call of the School to be an evangelisation and training resource for parishes.

We restated the *Vision* of the School :

AN EVANGELISING CHURCH

We clarified our *Mission Statement*:

TO CONTRIBUTE TO THE FORMATION OF EVANGELISING PARISHES BY OFFERING A FORMATION PROGRAM WHICH:

- ◆ FORMS DISCIPLES
- ◆ TRAINS EVANGELISERS
- ◆ ESTABLISHES PARISH SCHOOLS OF EVANGELISATION.

Let us rejoice in the Lord, for our Savior is born to the world. True peace has descended from heaven. A blessed Christmas to all!

These Parish Schools of Evangelisation would then reach out to other parishes to help them to establish Schools of Evangelisation. This multiplication of parish Schools was the original goal of the School. Diocesan Schools were formed as the first step in achieving this goal of parish Schools of Evangelisation throughout Australia. These Schools through the courses and evangelisation activities undertaken would, through the power of the Holy Spirit, change the mentality of a parish so that evangelisation would be an integral part of everything a parish does and every parishioner would live evangelisation as a natural part of being a disciple. The parish would reach out to those who don't know Jesus as each parishioner uses their gifts to evangelisation, in their own particular style, within an evangelising community.

Let's accept the challenge of a five year plan: Fifteen schools by 2007; Thirty by 2009; Sixty by 2011. Remember "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me" (Phil 4:13).

Schoolies Week with a Difference

No doubt the media has informed you of some of the antics that schoolies get up to when they have a holiday together. Let me tell you how different it can be for SOE schoolies.

On many occasions I have enjoyed Adelaide Hills hospitality at the home of Carmen and Anton Sylvester – a real blessing, and none more so than I experienced earlier this year. So what did we get up to? Carmen and I felt a call to respond to Pope John Paul's dedication of this year to the Eucharist and so we worked on expanding teachings we had given in order to present a stand alone seminar about this Sacrament of Sacraments.

Did we SOE schoolies stay up all hours and get drunk? Well, yes we did. We certainly stayed up all hours learning how to master PowerPoint – and drunk? To be honest, yes we did get drunk from time to time, but not in the way that the young schoolies generally do. Our inebriation was the type experienced on Pentecost day – it was the consequence of knowing the God was "in it" with us, that we weren't doing it alone. Anton gave us a few tips on PowerPoint and was eager to keep me topped up with curry and a red. We also had advice all the way from Rome regarding the graphics we needed. We worked out how to put it together to make a presentation using all the technology available to us, we were over joyed, till we didn't save something and lost a whole session! Oh well, it was all a learning curve, I'm sure God was saying "Hey, girls, you haven't quite mastered that, I think you better do it again".

The end results of Schoolies Weeks are often quite negative. Our result has been positive – a seminar which has already been presented in Adelaide and Melbourne. It is adaptable in that it can be presented in one day; or a session a week for 6 weeks; or in a more reflective way over a

weekend. The Eucharist Seminar not only offers INFORMATION about the Sacrament, it equips Catholics with ANSWERS for the many questions often asked by people who do not fully appreciate this Sacrament of Sacraments.

More importantly during the seminar there are opportunities to EXPERIENCE the healing power and grace of the Eucharist. The Seminar has 4 main topics covered in six sessions:

The Eucharist In God's Plan of Salvation in two sessions:

1st session: **Eucharist Prefigured in the Old Testament** - looking at some of the many events in the OT which are signs and symbols of the Eucharist.

2nd session: **Eucharist Prefigured, Promised and Fulfilled in the New Testament** - looking at some of the signs and symbols prefiguring and promising the Eucharist, this time in the NT and we will look closely at the Eucharistic fulfilment as instituted at the Last Supper.

The Eucharist - The Source And Summit Of Church Life -

discussing how the Sacrament of the Eucharist is central to our Christian faith.

The Eucharist Celebrated in two sessions:

1st session: **The Mass - A Sacrament, Sacrifice & Communion** worth celebrating.

2nd session: **Answering Objections, Clarifying Issues, Identifying Abuses** regarding the Mass.

The Eucharist Experienced - by the first disciples, right through to our own experience.

The seminar is based on Sacred Scripture, the Catechism of the Catholic Church, various Church documents including: *Redemptoris Missio, Dies Domini, Ecclesia De Eucharistia, Redemptionis Sacramentum, Mane Nobiscum*

Domini, John Paul II's Holy Thursday letter to his priests: *Shaped By the Eucharist* and it also draws on the wisdom and experience of the early church Fathers and Saints through the ages.

The sessions are imparted in a creative, exciting and innovative way using PowerPoint presentations. The age old truths of our Faith meet today's technology and the result is a very dynamic and effective learning experience. We ask: Does your heart burn with a desire to better understand the amazing Mystery of the Eucharist? Have you ever doubted the true presence of Jesus, Body, Soul and Divinity in the Eucharist? Would you like to be equipped to defend with boldness this Sacrament central to our Faith? If so, feel free to contact Carmen or myself. Perhaps the next time someone feels the urge to ask "Gee, Sandra you're always having holidays in Adelaide, what's the attraction?" it won't be necessary, as it will be evident that the 'attraction' is the blessing of spending time with a SOE Schoolie and her husband who share my love of the Blessed Sacrament and are eager to share that love with others.

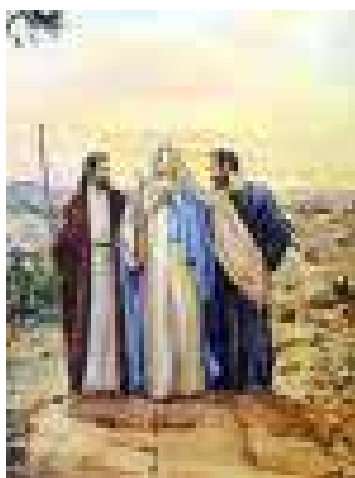

Each session of the course was preceded by joyous song, dancing and prayer. People relaxed into an accepting, friendly, supportive group to listen, and learn the meaning of “Seven Images from the Bible,” “Seven Effects of the Word,” and “Seven Commandments of the Word.”

In one session we dressed

up in clothes that would have been worn by the Jews in the old testament times and played out a scene in the Synagogue acting the parts of the prophets. By doing this we gained a fuller understanding of the bible texts about the coming of the Messiah, Jesus. With a great sensibility to the spirit, Fr. Denis O’ Bryan celebrated a special Emmaus Mass at the end of the weekend for us. We assembled outside in the sun before the Mass and Father Denis prepared us with a most interesting and enlightening talk about the meaning of Emmaus. The impact of his words engendered a deep reverence within us as we partook of the Eucharist.

In fitting conclusion to profound learning we were all presented with a Certificate of Attendance having completed the “Emmaus Course” by the School of Evangelisation.

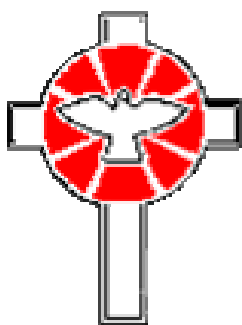

The Church hall was familiar, it had been my Church hall for over fifteen years, but for one weekend it was transformed. It became the road to Emmaus.

The School of Evangelisation's Emmaus School provided Catholics from all walks of life the opportunity to learn about the promise of Jesus in a much more profound way.

For those of us present, we embarked upon the journey to Emmaus to learn more about the scriptures and ourselves. And we were not disappointed. Like the disciples who walked along that now famous road, we had all experienced a personal Emmaus in our lives when we were disappointed in Jesus.

We had been blind and prevented in some way, from seeing Jesus as he really is. Words

cannot explain the fire in our own hearts now that we have our eyes focussed intently on our Lord.

We are all indebted to the speakers over the course of that weekend that, with the Holy Spirit working through them, challenged what we knew about Jesus as well as teaching us to depend entirely on God. Though our prayers may not be answered as soon as we want them to be, or even how we want them to be, God has not deserted us. He knows each of us intimately, and therefore he knows what is best for each of us individually.

For myself, the unworthy servant of the Lord that I am, I am more enthusiastic about evangelisation than ever before. At twenty years young, I have my whole life ahead of me to bring God's Word to those who do not know him, or love him as I do. And I

feel called now, like never before, to share this with the young people in our Church.

For many of us, the Emmaus School has changed us, perhaps only a little, perhaps a lot. We have a renewed and refreshed faith, and have been enriched by sharing this journey with those who completed this course with us and we are indebted to the team that ran this weekend.

Most importantly, we have now re-witnessed Jesus Christ, our Saviour, in all his glory and like the disciples we have returned to our own Jerusalem to spread the Word.



An Exam and a Proposal—A Personal Testimony

I had no vacation planned for the Christmas break of 2002, the company director's on-the-spot decision to close the office taking us all by surprise. But with nothing else going on I browsed the Internet, found that SOE was running a "John" course and enrolled in it without great enthusiasm. I remember doing it for the same reason that you eat your veggies: you may not care for the taste but expect that the practice will keep you in good health.

The course started uneventfully for me. The teachings were well-presented, as I had expected, and the dynamics true to the nature of the School. But I could find nothing new in the material; nothing seemed to catch fire from within. I had heard it all before. "The veggies have been too long in the fridge", I thought. As the day proceeded, however, a subtle change occurred: While my mind stayed alert and disengaged, I could feel another part of me being drawn into the proceedings.

Then it happened. We were into the second day and a group was presenting a scene: Jesus was calling people to be His disciples. Unlike those in the Gospels, however, these came up with any number of reasons why they weren't ready as yet to follow the Lord: business commitments, prior appointments, pressing engagements, the ordinary demands of life. Watching this scene and the parade of excuses being put forward, I was engulfed by a feeling of overwhelming sadness. It seemed to come from the depths, from a place I hardly knew. Gradually I broke into sobs, muffled at first but then out loud.

My mind, looking on with detachment, was thinking: "When you get such an emotional reaction from a relatively mundane scene rendered by, to put it politely, a bunch of amateur actors, you've definitely got a serious problem." But what was it that had caused this overpowering sense of loss? Could it be that this scene was an enactment of my own life? Was

there a part of me that wanted desperately to follow the Master, but was not ready to commit --- and was now at the point of heart-break?

As the day progressed, my composure returned, but the questions kept coming. Picking up on incidental points in the teachings, my thoughts raced off madly in all directions. Finally I decided to speak up, asking if there was time for some questions to be addressed, and was told, "There is someone coming now who will answer all your questions." This happened towards the end of a teaching and the next thing I saw was that the Blessed Sacrament was brought in!

"Maybe so", I reflected disappointedly, "but surely God works through human intermediaries. There is nothing more for me here." But within the space of a few minutes, I sensed something profound happening to my mind. I watched as my awareness gradually expanded. I seemed to have been raised to a great intellectual height, a point of vantage from where anything and everything can be understood. Under this sharpening of perception all the doubts that had previously assailed me grew smaller and smaller. As they receded into the distance, the ticking in my brain also slowed down and came to a halt.

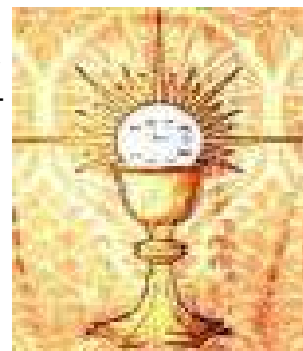
Then the questions came. This time, it was not I who was asking them. They were being addressed to me from a sheet of paper entitled "Entrance Exam: The School of Discipleship". The first question was "Have I decided to accept Jesus as my only Master, renouncing allegiance to any others who contradict His teaching?" Normally I would have tried giving a nuanced answer to this question, but there were only two boxes marked "Yes" and "No". As I rummaged through my mental filing cabinet for the right answer, I could feel a stirring within saying, "There is no right answer. Just pick the box you want to". Still I hesitated. "I have to get this right", I thought.

The other voice insisted, "No, you don't have to. Just pick the one you want to. It's a simple question." With this reassurance it finally dawned on me that something else within my chaotic self was being engaged: not my mind with its newfound powers, but my will. After a few moments, I ticked a box.

The other three questions came easily. I ticked the boxes, signed and dated the paper and put my pen down. Nothing extraordinary had happened, yet I felt an enormous sense of drama. Although it seemed all the time in the world, I had finished the Entrance Exam in less than 15 seconds. I looked around the room. Everything looked normal. No angels. No harps. No bells or choruses. Just some other people immersed in thought, some obviously having difficulty with the Exam!

This was the highlight of the course for me. Everything else that followed was simply a commentary.

Looking back over this incident after a few years, I understand better now the significance of what had happened. God had proposed to me and I had accepted. Without my knowing it, He had been preparing me through the teachings and, when the time was right, in full public view and in total privacy, He had popped the question. This union would be one that would not end in death but would continue through eternity. Naturally, all relationships have their moments of the sublime interspersed with long stretches of the ordinary, and the passage of time has once again brought me down to earth. But I am less inclined now to dismiss the traditional teachings of the Church as veggies gone stale, for I remember in this incident the Spirit of the One who can make all things new.

May each and everyone experience the wonder and blessings of Emmanuel this Christmas Season.

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
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
