'EMMAUS' goes to Papua New Guinea



The first evangelising course for P.N.G., 'Emmaus', took place in the Diocesan Pastoral Centre in Goroka. It started on Monday evening (25th November 2019) with a short introduction and finished on Thursday (28th November 2019) with the Emmaus Eucharist.

Sixteen people participated, among them four priests, eight religious sisters, two seminarians and two nuns from Kundiawa Hospital. They represented six dioceses: Kerema, Madang, Kundiawa, Hagen, Mendi and Goroka.

On our journey from Jerusalem to Emmaus we had the opportunity to listen to Jesus speaking to us and explaining Scriptures. We learned and experienced what the Word of God is, what kind of fruit it bears and what should our response be to the Word of God. With each session of the course we felt more and more how our hearts were burning and our joy was increasing and we found out that the source of it could only be the Word of God – Jesus himself!

During testimonies at the end of the course participants shared their experiences and expressed their desire to participate in future courses.

We would like to express our gratitude to the School of Evangelisation in Melbourne, Australia. Thanks to the School we were able to run and participate in the course in Goroka, PNG. Hopefully the first course was not the last and we will continue our co-operation. Our dream is to form a School of Evangelisation in Goroka diocese and we believe that, if it is the Will of God, our dream will become reality.

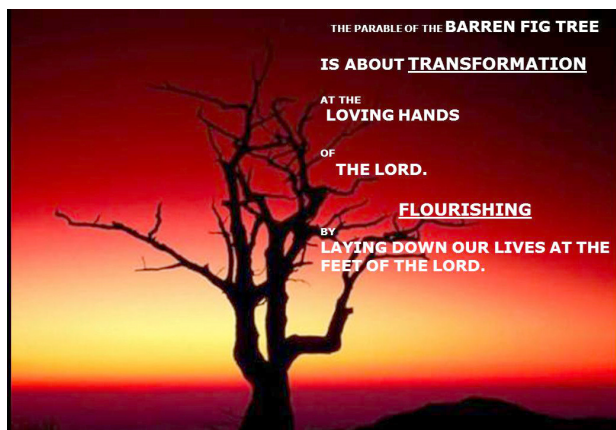

The Parable of the Barren Fig Tree By Mark Power



“And he answered him, ‘Sir, leave the tree alone this year, until I have a chance to dig around it and manure it.’⁹ Then if it should bear fruit next year, well and good; but if not, you can cut it down.”

Father emphasised the patience of God and how He is always ready to forgive us and give us another chance to turn back to him. By turning back to Jesus, we restore and repair our lives.

In the context of turning back, Father talked about the vine and the branches from the Gospel of John, (Jn.15:1-8,) to explain that just making a decision to turn back was not enough as ***“we can only bear fruit if we are attached to Christ”***.

The day was full of hope and new beginnings. It was wonderful and I hope that Fr. Santiago will join us again to share from his wisdom, which appears to be massive when it comes to planting and sowing and all to do with the land! He made the Parable come alive for us as it must have been for the people of the land listening to Jesus.

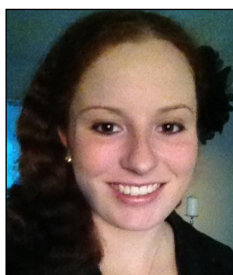

The team decided to survey our data base to find out which of our courses people would like us to present. The verdict came back and it was the 'Joshua'. Rather a surprise seeing that we have presented this course in little old Adelaide at least eight times since we were introduced to it by the community of "Koinonia John the Baptist" from Rome. So we scheduled it for 24th & 25th August.

Another surprise!! We had just three registrations when the day came but true to our decision to still go ahead, regardless of numbers, produced the miracle we were hoping for. Twenty-two people walked through the door to participate in this course. Praise be to our faithful God!

One of our own team members had not experienced this course and he judged it to be the best. Fr Selva also came to celebrate Mass for us on Saturday and he was impressed with the content of the course. In his words: "Wow powerful teachings."

Following the life of Joshua with his weaknesses and strength as we draw parallels to our own lives can be challenging for both participants and team.

The opening talk when we make a decision to cross over the Jordan into the Promised Land and find there the abundance of the fruit of the land can give you a sense that this is going to be fun

weekend. The table of plenty was certainly enjoyed by everyone but then we moved into more serious stuff to discover how to develop a Winning Mentality and the challenges we need to overcome just as Joshua did to stay steadfast in our journey of faith.

Identifying the strongholds that we built up in our minds was a bit of a wakeup call for all of us there. We realised how they can lead us to a defeatist attitude both in our everyday lives and in our spiritual life.

For me one of the most powerful and moving teachings is when the participants and team write their Impossible Problems on a piece of paper and we attach them to the Jericho Wall. As we walk around the wall Joshua style and pray into what appears to be insurmountable problems we get a sense of unburdening on the hearts of the participants. **AND THE WALLS COME TUMBLING DOWN.**

On the Sunday we joined the parish for the Mass which was celebrated by a long-time friend. To our surprise he gave the School a good plug which encouraged us no end.

Praise be to God that we were obedient to God and still went ahead even when we had just three participants registered. God came to the party and blessed us abundantly at the Joshua Weekend.

BEYOND THE DESERT – THE LIFE OF MOSES

I thought I knew all there was to know about Moses! I've read the Bible! I knew he led the Hebrews to freedom, to the Promised Land and of course, I've seen the movie! What a surprise when I attended 'Moses', a course held over Cup weekend, 2nd to 5th November 2019. I hadn't intended to go, I had other 'stuff' to do and told Sandra that on the phone a few days earlier and also when I helped set up on Friday afternoon in St. Clare's Hall, Box Hill North!

But apparently, Sandra and a few others prayed for rain and of course it rained on Friday night, so I gave up gardening plans (not unreluctantly to be honest) and duly fronted up on Saturday, 2nd November for four days of Moses. Four days of Moses, surely there was not that much to talk about for four days. How wrong I was, and little did I know that I was going back to school!

At the SCHOOL OF PHARAOH, we learnt about Pharaoh's forced slavery of the Hebrews and how the Hebrew midwives outwitted his methods of keeping the population under control. The Hebrews valued life, but their prayers were not being answered, and we were asked, where is God when we are suffering? Does He answer our prayers?

Of course, everything God makes is good, but no-one can serve or value others if they do not recognise the dignity and value of their own self. Do we see this in others was the question?

We all know Moses led a charmed life in Pharaoh's palace, he received an education, lived in palatial surroundings, ate good food, but all was not milk and honey for him. He was despised and feared by the Egyptians and in turn, the Hebrews regarded him as a traitor. Why does God write straight on crooked lines?

Moses made mistakes when he responded to injustice and these mistakes were his undoing with the result that he fled to the desert. He was misunderstood and rejected by both sides of his family. It was easier to leave Egypt than attempt to change it and he chose solitude rather than face further rejection. Why didn't God use a brave and violent Moses we were asked?

At the SCHOOL OF MIDIAN, we found Moses content to sit at a well for forty years minding Jethro's sheep and focusing on the simple things of life and during those forty years, contemplating the rejection he experienced in Egypt.

He called his sons Gershom (stranger in a foreign land) and Eliezer (my father's God is my helper) a reflection on his life, rejection and protection. We were asked if Gershom experiences were necessary in our life!

Then Moses found God in the Burning Bush. He was accepted by God; his past was behind him. God demanded respect and obedience and we were asked to hand in our timetable and move beyond our comfort zone!

God revealed Himself to Moses at the Burning Bush! *"I am who I am"* God replied to Moses, *"but don't come too near and take off those shoes"*! During the time Moses spent at the Burning Bush he was inflamed, he received his Mission, but not before giving excuse after excuse as to his inability to carry out the mission until finally admitting that he just didn't want to go. But God does not give up, on anybody. He told Moses that his brother Aaron would be with him and finally, the Hebrews had a liberator. We were asked which of Moses excuses we relate to and told to identify our gift.

Moses was changed by the burning bush experience; he now had a friend. A friend with whom he could share his pain and doubts. A friend who would listen to him and he was not the man who ran away from rejection forty years earlier. He **would** lead the Hebrews to freedom. We were asked who is winning the battle within us, Pharaoh or Moses?

In the SCHOOL OF THE DESERT we were introduced to the Passover. While I knew a little about the Passover, it was interesting to hear it all again and just wonder at the significance of each and every action and symbol. Lighting candles and drinking wine to washing of hands. Eating unleavened bread and hiding part in a cloth for children to find later. We had our greens, parsley dipped in salted water (yum!), a lamb shank bone and also a roasted egg. The Passover meal finishes with horse radish and a mixture of apples, cinnamon, nuts and wine. Everything, including the way the food was consumed and why, had a reason, all of which was set out in the Haggadah. We were asked if we realise that the best way for us to reach our destination is not necessarily the shortest and quickest?

The Exodus, either fight to the death or drown, not much of a choice, well perhaps return to slavery, another bad choice. But Moses had all the answers. ***“Do not fear and today God will intervene in our favour, he will fight for you.”*** And so, it happened, with the Egyptians in pursuit, Moses stretched out his hand over the Red Sea and the waters parted for the Hebrews who crossed in safety while the water came back upon the Egyptians who were drowned.

The Song of Deliverance which was sung by Moses and the Hebrews had three main points. ***“The Lord is my strength, my song and who is like thee, O Lord, among the gods.”*** We were asked what was our ‘Red Sea’ and when has the Lord delivered us from a hopeless situation?

Then the Hebrews were in the desert, no water for days and then finally undrinkable water. The people began to complain and find fault with Moses who spoke to the Lord who gave him a solution. The people had very quickly lost their faith in God, and it happened time and time again. They asked Moses why had he brought them into the wilderness to die! We were asked, when has God asked us to do something difficult, impossible and ridiculous?

The Hebrews had forgotten the sorrow and suffering they endured in Egypt preferring Pharaoh’s food, garlic and onions and enslavement, to faith in God. Not happy with the Manna which God provided they demanded Moses provide meat. Moses was perhaps desperate after putting up with constant complaining when he spoke to God and said he would prefer to be put to death because the burden of the people was too heavy! God acknowledged Moses limitations and organised for seventy elders to share the load with Moses and also provided meat, but at a cost. We were asked

what enslaves us? And do we feel anxious and desperate about a problem, thinking we have exhausted all the solutions?

While Moses encountered God up the mountain, down below, the people were making their own god in the image of man which brought the wrath of God upon them. Moses intervened on behalf of the people again and pleaded with God to change his mind, reminding Him of His promise to Abraham. Moses, the diplomat persuaded God to not bring disaster upon his people. And we were asked if we try to push God around or are we ready for Him to carry us like an eagle carries it’s young on its wings.

More complaints to God about Moses, this time from Aaron and Miriam and God’s anger turned on Miriam who becomes leprous. Through all this, God defended Moses but Moses has to continually confront rebellious men who tell him and Aaron that they have gone too far, they question their motives, but their own motives are not so pure either. They are envious, they seek the priesthood for themselves and some, Dathan and Abiram, are downright rebellious towards Moses. Moses seeks comfort with his friend, the Lord and we were asked what our solution for community building was.

Still in the desert and now the people face another challenge. Do they enter the Land of Canaan which flows with milk and honey, or do they listen to negativity? Caleb and Joshua are ready to conquer the land and they have a proposal. Joshua tells them, ***“The land is good, if God will be with us, the enemy are like bread and God loves the truth that lies in the depth of the heart and finally, everything works for the good.”***

God is not happy with the people and threatens to destroy them. Again, Moses intervenes, and God’s wrath is lessened. God tells Moses he will not enter the Promised Land and even shows him where he will be buried. We pondered **our** dream and vision for the future.

Again, the people speak out against God and Moses saying, ***“Why have you brought us out of Egypt to die in the wilderness and to eat miserable food”*** to which God replies by sending poisonous serpents among the people and again, Moses intervenes. God demands a bronze serpent be made and the people when bitten were instructed to look at the

serpent and would live. Eventually the serpent became an idol which had to be destroyed. Which bronze serpent did we have to destroy we were asked?

Moses had FIVE REQUESTS OF GOD. He was not afraid to speak with God, his friend, even to the extent of negotiating with him regarding whether God should accompany the people when they left Mt. Sinai. Moses told Him, *"the people are yours."* Moses still cannot persuade God to show himself, only allowing him to see His back and no amount of persuading or asking will change God's mind and allow Moses to enter the Promised Land, referring back to when Moses struck the rock at Meribah and brought forth water, when in fact God asked him to command the rock to bring forth water (not strike it), thereby undermining God. Moses successes in the past were the result of God's graciousness and mercy, not his own doing. We were asked what five important requests would we seek from God?

Apart from the assistance of God, Moses had a Great team of Collaborators with him during the forty years in the desert. Aaron, his elder brother was his spokesperson and who he later entrusted with the priesthood. Hobab, a relation of his wife was the eyes of the caravan and his local knowledge was an asset. His sister's husband Hur who with Aaron supported Moses on the mountain as he held his arms aloft with his staff when the Amalekites attacked. Jethro, his father-in-law and adviser who challenged Moses to accept responsibilities and instructed him how to delegate and manage his time. Joshua who grew up with Moses and who Moses trained as his successor, a decision which was confirmed by God. With this trustworthy group of people around him, Moses had plenty of support, but he did not have time to foster friendships, apart from God, and we were asked if we had friends as well as collaborators?

Finally, the GRADUATION OF MOSES. At the threshold of the Promised Land God kept His promise to Moses, to bring the people to the Promised Land and it is here that God commissions Joshua and tells Moses his time is near. Moses advises Joshua to remain faithful to his commission. God then took Moses up to Mount Nebo and even at 120 Moses was full of vigour. Then Moses, the servant of the Lord, died in the land of Moab and there he was buried. We were asked to name three important decisions in our life.

No one knows where Moses is buried, however, we only need to read Sacred Scripture, see the EPITAPH TO MOSES. A humble man and a faithful servant of God. Jewish mentality sees the Suffering Servant of Isaiah as Moses, whereas Christian mentality sees the Suffering Servant of Isaiah as Jesus. Most importantly, Moses had a unique relationship with God who understood him and accepted him as he was. God was a friend to whom he was able to express his innermost thoughts and a friend who inflamed him with a passion. What would we write for our own tombstone we were asked?

When I left the course, I had that feeling you have when you have experienced something wonderful and you don't want it to finish. That is how I felt, and it remained with me as I wrote this article, remembering things that we were asked to join in such as surrendering our jewellery to be made into a golden

TESTIMONY - Pierre Lengo

I was born in the Democratic Republic of Congo in a Catholic family. Dad was very strict with religious affairs, which meant Sunday Mass was compulsory and we had to be involved in church activities. Like many kids my age I was an altar boy till I turned 13 years old at which age I decided that I will start reading in church (because I thought it was much cooler). All this was routine while growing up, but I still hadn't had that personal encounter with GOD. I still believe that the seed was planted, and foundations laid came in handy when I finished school.

My first and conscious engagement with GOD started when I turned 18. My Parents decided that it would be best for me to do my university studies in South Africa. This was the first time I was away from my parents and in a foreign country. Things did not start well because I had some complications with my applications at the University. This I believe was the way GOD used to reveal Himself to me. I grew up relying entirely on my parents, and with that factor removed from the equation I was lost and in an unfamiliar territory. GOD removed me from my comfort zone so that I may know Him better. I turned to GOD. I was no longer doing just the routine things like praying before a meal or attending Masses every Sunday. I started reading the bible every morning and meditating. I would always write down what I understood and what GOD was telling me. Ten minutes read turned to thirty and then an hour. And doors started opening in my life. I got a miraculous place at university.

While doing all that I still felt like something was missing, it felt like I wasn't doing enough. Once I finished my studies and started my professional life, I moved houses to be closer to work, and joined a new parish (Our Lady of Lourdes City Deep). I joined the Charismatic group but still had that burning sensation that I needed to do more. I kept asking GOD to show me what to do. Then one day Father Blaise who is the parish priest at our Lady of Lourdes (City Deep) in Johannesburg called me to his office and told me that GOD asked him to speak to me. He didn't know me at the time. He asked me to join the men's group. This was a newly formed group whose mission included inspiring men to encourage each other into living a life of faith; making men realise their spiritual responsibilities towards their families, etc. The Motto was, "That man is you" (2 Samuel 12 7). Throughout my time at the parish, GOD helped me serve Him in different ministries and groups such as catechism (confirmation classes), Special minister of the Eucharist.

Since moving to Australia, GOD has blessed me by helping me join the choir and Charismatic Renewal group. Few months ago, we started a group of devotion to the DIVINE MERCY. I'm looking forward to what GOD has in store for me.

In Serena Williams' hands . . . Nothing short of miraculous.

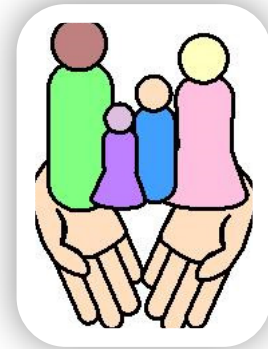
A rod in my hands . . . ?? A rod in Moses's hand . . . Miraculous.

Whenever you are in trouble surrender everything in God's hand. Watch the amazing transformation that will take place in your life.

Walk with God every day and never underestimate the power of your cry for help from a Higher Power.

When you worry – Mt 6/19-34

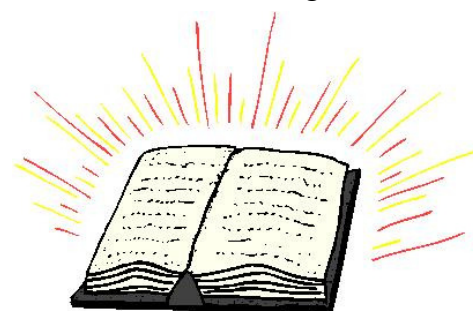
When you are lonely and fearful – Psalm 23

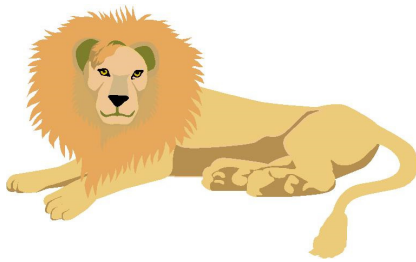

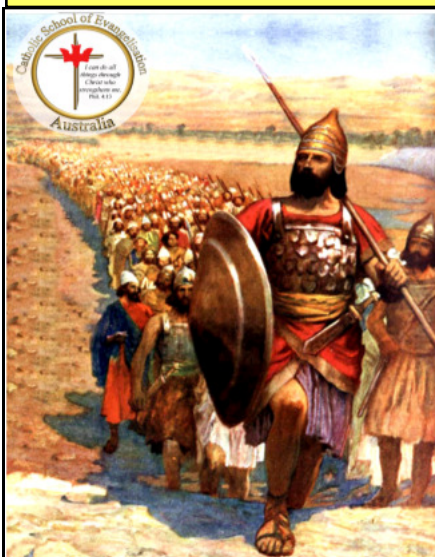
